On August 31, 2023, Santa Ana Active Streets, in partnership with with the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) and Go Human, hosted the Willard Safe Streets Summer Night Celebration. The event served as a local community gathering and encouraged residents to learn about a temporary artistic crosswalk, showcased to provide opportunities to experience safer crossings. The community had the opportunity to provide input into the design of the crosswalk. At the event, youth had the opportunity to play games, enjoy outdoor activities, and contribute their creativity towards beautifying their neighborhood.





Project Goals

In partnership with the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) and with support from California Walks, Santa Ana Active Streets led a temporary safety demonstration project as a part of their Willard Safe Streets Summer Nights event. The goals of the Willard Safe Streets Summer Nights event and temporary safety demonstration project, sought to capture community input into the design for an artistic crosswalk that is to be installed at the intersection of 15th Street and Ross Street. The event also aimed to increase traffic safety awareness, through helmet distribution, fitting and education.

- Promote walking, bicycling, and healthy active living among community members.
- Provide education on and build awareness around safe walking and bicycling.
- Collect feedback and input from the community.
- Provide opportunity to share their design ideas for implementing an artistic crosswalk

Participants were asked to share their ideas for what themes and designs they wanted to see in the new artistic crosswalk.



The main themes centered around bright and colorful designs with a focus on school, family, and kids.

Next Steps

- Gather the designs created by the community as well as their feedback and develop a formal proposed artistic design for consideration for implementation;
- Continue to engage the community through pop-up events, outreach efforts, and other engagement pathways to build further support for the deployment of the artistic crosswalk at 15th Street and Ross Street; and,
- Review considerations for an alternative or additional location at Ross Street and Washington Avenue, which was raised several times by community members
